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The Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute brings nationally respected professional artists to Quartz Mountain every summer to teach or-nestra, acting, mime, ballet, modern dance, photography, printmaking, painting and creative writting to approximately 200 students between the ages of fourteen and eighteen who are chosen by competitive audition. The aim of the Institute is to offer students an opportunity to develop a heightened awareness of their own talents and abilities in a mentorship situation with professional artists in a beautiful natural environment. For some, it may simply encourage them to return to their hometowns as leaders in their schools, and as participants in the cultural life of their communities. But for others, it just may provide that mesessary measure of motivate them to pursue a successful full-time career in the arts.

The Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute was incorporated as a non-profit organization in 1976 through the statewide efforts of artists, educators and cultural leaders in response to requests from parents seeking summer arts training for their children. FACULTY

David Becker · Conductor



David Eugene Becker, conductor and violist, was named to the faculty of the University of Miami School of Music as conductor-in-residence of the Symphony Orchestra Program and assistant conductor of the Florida Philharmonic in August, 1980. He is also principal violist with the Philharmonic and plays viola with the University of Miami Faculty String Owartet.

Becker received a bachelor of music degree from Ithaca College in New York, and after receiving a Graduate Playing Fellowship award from the Louisville Orchestra under George Mester and the University of Louisville, he earned a master's in music performance in 1969. He then assumed the position of professor of applied viola at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music, where he worked with the Conservatory Symphony Orchestra and String Arts Ensemble.

His career as a performing violist has included the Syracuse Symphony, Santa Fe Opera, the Atlanta Symphony under Robert Shaw, Satori String Trio, the Ensemble Wisconsin, American Pro Art Quartet in residence at the University of Georgia, the Capella Academica Wien in Yelman, the Lawrence Conservatory Piano Quartet and violist with the famed Austriam violinist Eduard Melkus and his String Quartet touring in this country and throughout Europe.

Becker has recently conducted the Lawrence Conservatory Symphony Orchestra, Chamber Orchestra and Opera Orchestra and the Wisconsin Youth Symphony Orchestra.

Don Coen · Painter



Don Coem's dynamic watercolor and acrylic landscapes have appeared in many exhibitions, especially throughout the western part of the United States.

Coen has participated in many recent shows including the Yellowstone Invitational, the Santa Fe Arts Festival, the Aspen Foundation for the Arts, the Oklahoma Eight States Exhibit and Boulder Cross-section Invitational. In 1979, Coen was commissioned by the Colorado Council of Arts and Humanities to do four paintings for Governor's Awards to be presented by Governor Lamm.

He has presented one-man exhibitions at the Yellowstone Art Center, the Houston Space Center, the Rive Gauche Art Gallery in Denver, the Vail Gallery of Rive Gauche and the Jaladas Gallery in Boulder. Coen was one of 14 Colorado artists selected by the Denver Art Museum for the inaugural exhibition of the new Denver Art Museum in the early 1970s, and he was a guest panelist for the Associated Council for the Arts in New York.

He was one of six American artists selected by the National Endowment for the Arts for a \$10,000 Artist in Residence Grant. And, he was one of the artists selected for the film, "See Touch Feel," made by the Endowment in 1970 and directed by Donald Wrey.

Denis de Coteau · Conductor



Denis de Coteau is music director and conductor for the San Francisco Ballet and its Performing Arts Orchestra. He is also a professor of music in the College of Fine Arts at California State University at Hayward and conducts the university orchestra.

Maestro de Coteau, a violinist by training, has received critical acclaim for his conducting assignments in the United States and in Europe, including orchestras in Chicago, St. Louis, Seattle, Berlin, London and Stockholm.

Born in New York City, de Coteau earned bachelors and master's degrees in music from New York University. He received a doctorate in music from Stanford University. He has won the Pierre Monteux Conducting Prize, ASCAP Award for Adventuresome Programming of American Composers' Music in 1976 and was named Outstanding Black Musician by the National Association of Negro Musicians in 1973. He also received resolutions of commendation for his work from the California State Legislature in 1974 and 1976.

Working with young musicians is nothing new for Maestro de Coteau. From 1970 until 1979, he conducted the Oakland Symphony Youth Orchestra, a group of first-class musicians aged 15 to 18 which gained international honors. He has also conducted the Sydney Summer Festival and the Australian Youth Orchestra.

Terry Gravett · Serigrapher



Master printer Terry Gravett is director of technical printing at Brighton Polytechnic, Brighton, England, and an instructor at the Camberwell School of Art in London.

Born in England in 1938, Gravett studied at the Croydon School of Art in South London and graduated in the visual arts fields of painting and printmaking. In 1957, he exhibited figurative paintings at Young Contemporaries.

After military service in Cyprus where he did landscape paintings and several portraits, Gravetr returned to Croydon and continued painting and began teaching in state schools on a part-time basis. He became an instructor at Brighton Polytechnic in 1969, In 1973, Gravett was one of two individuals selected to create a pilot scheme for Artists in Schools, sponsored by the Greater London Arts Association.

A master silk screen artist, Gravett was a member of the British Printmakers' Council for five years. His art works have been exhibited in more than 30 shows abroad. Some of his prints and paintings are included in the Victoria and Albert Museum and at the Arts Council of Great Britain. He has exhibited one-man shows at several museums and galleries including the William Weston Gallery in London and Sussex University.

Bert Houle · Mime



Bert Houle performs and teaches theater without words -- the art of mime. He is co-director of the Houle-Wibaux Mime Company in San Francisco with his partner Sophie Wibaux.

Bloule and Wibaux formed their partnership while working in Paris with Etienne Decroux, considered the father of modern mine. In the last 10 years, Houle and Wibaux have extensively toured through the United States and abroad. Together the partners have created and homed more than two dozen pieces during their travels and at home in San Francisco. "A lot goes into mime -- concentration, discipline, sensitivity, awareness, tension, love, hate, anger and joy. It's life," Houle explains. Their concert tours have been sponsored by the Mid America Arts Alliance, the Western State Arts Foundation, the Maryland Arts Council, the Rockefeller Foundation and the Dance Touring Program of the National Endowment for the Arts.

Houle was born in Manchester, New Hampshire, and began performing pantonime in the Boston area while still a teenager. He graduated with a degree in drams from Emerson College. After college, he moved to New York City where he performed with the National Shakespeare Company, the La Mama and regional theaters across the country. In 1967, he was awarded a Fullbright grant to study in Paris with Decroux.

William Levis · Actor



William Levis, associate professor in the School of Theatre at Florida State University, is returning for a second year to teach acting at the Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute.

Levis has acted in and directed more than 100 stage productions in the United States, Australia and Great Britian. A graduate of the University of Oklahoma, he earned master's and doctorate degrees from the University of Minnesota, specializing in dramatic literature, theatre history and acting theory.

A native of Sydney, Australia, Levis is a graduate of the Sydney Conservatorium of Music, affiliated with the Royal College of Music in London, England, and the Independent Theatre School of Dramatic Art in Sydney. He performed as a professional actor with the BBC-TV in London from 1963 to 1966 and acted with the Tyrone Guthrie Theatre from 1968 to 1971.

He has acted on stage with Dame Judith Anderson, toured with Linda Kelsey (of television's "Lou Grant"), acted in television with Albert Finney, Sir John Gielgud and Peter Graves and in films with the late Peter Finch

He has won numerous awards for his acting and directing efforts including the Evening Standard Newspaper Award for Best TV Series, United Kingdom, 1964; Van Heflin Award, Most Promising Fine Arts Graduate, University of Oklahoma, 1968; Best Actor, Bittner Award, University of Munnesota, 1969, and Best Director, Sydney Morning Herald Award, 1974.

Georgina Parkinson · Ballerina



Georgina Parkinson is an English ballerina known for her beauty and powerful stage presence. A former ballerina with London's Royal Ballet, she is now ballet mistress with the American Ballet Theatre. Miss Parkinson was invited to join the ABT by Mikhail Baryshnikov, when he was appointed artistic director of the company in 1980. She had previously worked with Baryshnikov during the filming of "The Turning Point."

Born in Brighton, England, Miss Parkinson received a scholarship to study at the Royal Ballet School at age 13. She joined the Royal Ballet Company when she was 17 years old and became the youngest member of that company to tour the United States.

She created the role of Rosaline in MacMillan's "Romeo and Juliet" in 1965 and later danced the parts of Juliet and Ludy Capulet. Her first created role was in Andree Howard's "La Belle Dame Sans Merci." John Cranko created his ballet "Daphnis and Chloe" for her with Erik Bruhm for the Stuttgart Ballet. Other roles created for Miss Parkinson include Monotones I and Wimifred Narbury in "Enigma Variations," a work by Frederick Ashton.

Her most famous role is la garconne in Bronislava Nijinska's revival of "Les Biches" for the Royal Ballet. She has also danced the Zsarina in MacMillan's "Anastasia;" the role of Terpsichore in "Apollo;" the queen of the Wilis in "Giselle," the lead in "Song of the Earth" and Elizabeth of Austria in "Maverlins."

Richard Ross · Photographer



Free-lance professional photographer Richard Ross of Santa Barbara, California, is returning this year to teach photography at the Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute.

Ross graduated from the University of Vermont in 1967, then studded at the Rhode Island School of Design, Syracuse University, Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs and the New School for Social Research. He earned a master's in fine arts degree from the University of Florida in 1973 and served as an instructor in the art department there.

In 1976, he became assistant professor of art at Sonoma State College in Rohmert Park, California. He joined the faculty at the University of California at Santa Barbara in 1977.

Ross has won numerous awards at more than 50 competitive shows across the country including the Boston Printmakers and Society of American Graphic Artists. He has exhibited one-man shows at Ellen Sragow Ltd., in New York City; Augusta College, Augusta, Georgia, the ARCO Center for Visual Arts in California and the Trend House Gallery in Florida.

Jane Shore · Writer & Poet



Jane Shore, writer and poet, is assistant professor in the Department of English at Tufts University, Medford, Nassachusetts. She is returning for the third consecutive year to teach writing at the Oklahoma Summer Atts Institute.

Two books of her poetry have been published, <u>Lying Bowm in the Olive</u>
Press and <u>Eye Level</u>, which was awarded the <u>Juniper Prize</u>. Her poems have
been published in many anthologies and national magazines, including <u>The New Republic</u>, <u>Poetry and Ploughshare</u>. She was awarded the Bess Hokin
Prize by <u>Poetry</u> magazine (1973), the National Endowment for the Arts
Grant (1978) and the Grant in Poetry, Creative Artists Public Service
Program (GAP) in 1980.

Shore was born in North Bergen, New Jersey, and graduated from Goddard College. She earmed a master's degree in 1971 from the University of Iowa, then became a Fellow in Poetry at the Radcliffe Institute. Since 1973 she has taught at Harvard and Sarah Lawrence College and last year was a visiting professor at the University of Washington in Seattle. Shore has also taught writing workshops at The Poetry Center in New York City, the Aspen Writers Conference and the University of Michigan.

Shore was one of 74 poets invited to attend a reception and White House salute in 1980 to Poets and American Poetry. She has given more than 40 poetry readings at universities and writer's conferences across the country.

Ko Yukihiro · Modern Dancer



Ko Yukihiro, a native of Japan, is assistant professor of dance and director of the modern dance program at the University of Oklahoma. For the OU Modern Dance Company he has choreographed and performed more than 20 original works.

At the University of Hawaii, he earned a bachelors and master's in fine arts in dance while performing extensively for Carl Wolz, Yasuki Sasa, Betty Jones, Fritz Ludin, Ethel Winter, Yakako Asakawa, David Hatch Walker and Bill Ross. He studied on full scholarship at the Martha Graham School of Contemporary Dance in New York and taught elemental Graham classes for the School.

Yukihiro has danced and taught professionally for several modern dance companies including Saeko Ichinohe, Diane Germaine, Joan Lombardi, the Contemporary Dance Ssytem, the Ballet Nacional de Mexico and the Hawaii Dance Theatre. He has also taught at Amherst College and the American College Dance Festival at the University of Iowa.

In 1976, he began teaching at OU. In the past year he has conducted modern dance master classes at the Southwestern Regional Ballet Festival in Houston, The Dallas Black Dance Theatre and Southold Dance Theatre in South Bend. Indiana.

For the past two years, Yukihiro has auditioned dance talent for the Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute.

Jane Alexander-Actress



Jane Alexander is a skilled actress of international reputation. She has starred in numerous movie and television films and stage plays. Some of her more recent films include All The President's Men (1975), The Betsy (1977), Kramer vs. Kramer (1979), Brubaker (1980) and Night Crossing (1981).

Her long list of leading lady roles in stage plays includes Broadway, off-Broadway and regional theatre. She originated the role of Eleanor Bachman in The Great White Hope on Broadway and received the "Tony," Theatre World Award and Drama Desk Award for her portrayal. She was also nominated for a "Tony" for her stage roles in 6 Rms Rv Vu, Find Your Way Home and First Monday in October.

She received Academy Award nominations for her roles in <u>All The President's Men</u>, <u>Kramer vs. Kramer and The Great White Hope</u>, in which she recreated her stage role of Eleanor Bachman.

For her numerous films for television she has received an Emmy Award for <u>Playing for Time</u> (1980) and an Emmy nomination and T.V. Critics Circle Award for Eleanor and Franklin; The White House Years.

In her concern for the arts as a business, she has become deeply involved in the American Council for the Arts, Theatre Communications Group, the Corporate Theatre Fund and the Harvard Theatre Collection. She has served on various committees for these organizations, and in 1981 she was general chairman of the fundraising benefit for the American Council for the Arts at Carnegie Hall.

Terry Allen-Multi-media Artist



Terry Allen is a multi-media artist whose youth in Lubbock, Texas, is indelibly imprinted in his art. Allen's work has been exhibited at major art institutions across the country including: The Whitney Museum of American Art and the Museum of Modern Art, New York City; the National Collection of Fine Arts, Smithsonian Institution (now the National Museum of American Art), Washington, D.C.; the Art Institute, Chicago; the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art and the Fort Worth Art Museum. Individual shows have been exhibited at several museums, including the Nelson Gallery-Adkins Museum, Kansas City, the Pasadena Art Museum, the Chicago Art Institute and the Contemporary Art Museum, in Houston, Texas.

Allen is a graduate of the Chouinard Art Institute, Los Angeles, Calif. He is also a songwriter and musical performer. His songs have been recorded by Bobby Bare and Little Feat. His own recordings include three albums, "Juares" (1975), "Lubbock (on everything)" (1978) and "Smokin the Dummy" (1980).

Some of Allen's most extensive works include "The Ring," a highly complex narrative which includes drawings, collages, assembled constructions, a theater occurrence, a video tape and lithographs, and "Juarez," also a narrative exhibit consisting of 35 drawings, collage drawings, assembled constructions and a recorded album of sones.

Richard Hunt-Sculptor



Richard Hunt, an internationally-known artist, is most noted as a sculptor. At the age of 13, he became a student at The Art Institute of Chicago and graduated in 1957. After graduation, he travelled widely in Europe on the James Nelson Raymond Foreign Travel Fellowship.

Before Hunt reached the age of 25, his works in metals, welding and casting had been included in several prestigious group exhibitions and he had presented his first one-man exhibition at the Alan Gallery in New York. He was awarded the Guggenheim Fellowship in 1952 and began doing lithographs on a Tamarind Artists Fellowship in 1955. President Lyndon Johnson appointed Hunt in 1968 to the National Council on the Arts.

A major retrospective of his work was shown in 1971 at the Museum of Modern Art, New York, and The Art Institute of Chicago. Once-man exhibitions have been shown at the Cleveland Museum of Art and his New York gallery, the Dorsky Gallery. Hunt's sculptures are included in public collections at dozens of major art institutions across the country including the Metropolitan Museum of Art and the Whitney Museum of American Art, New York City, the Nelson Gallery-Atkins Museum in Kansas City, the Cincinnati Art Museum and the Hirshhorn Museum and Sculpture Garden, Washington, D.C.

In addition to his vigorous exhibition schedule, the artist has been a visiting artist and professor at more than a dozen major American colleges and universities.

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Gabor Rejto-Cellist



Gabor Rejto has performed with many of the major symphony orchestras in the world. He was a member of the Lener and Gordon String Quartets and has appeared with the Hungarian and Paganini Quartets. For the past 30 years, he has been the cellist of the Alma Trio.

Equally acclaimed for his solo and chamber music interpretations with the cello, Rejto has performed extensively in the United States, Australia, New Zealand, Africa, Japan and Europe.

He is also considered one of the foremost cello instructors in this country. Since 1954, Rejto has been chairman of the string department in the School of Music at the University of Southern California. He also gives summer master classes in cello and chamber music at the Music Academy of the West in Santa Barbara, Calif. In 1972 he was chosen "Artist-Teacher of the Year" by the American String Teachers Association.

Gabor Rejto was born in Budapest, Hungary. His mastery of the cello brought him early recognition. Following his graduation from the Royal Academy in Budapest, he moved to Spain to study with Pablo Casals. He came to the United States in 1939.

Shahrokh Rezvani-Visual Artist



Shahrokh Rezwani works in various media including intaglio, paper, monotypes and cliche-verre. He has presented numerous workshops and lecture demonstrations at the Tucson Museum of Art, the Tamarind Institute, the University of Arizona and Farabi University in Iran.

Rezvani's work has been exhibited in the Museum of Fine Art in Houston, the Phoenix Art Museum, the Indiana State Arts Competition, Zand Gallery in Tehran and the Basel International in Switzerland. His art works are included in collections around the world including the National Gallery of Art, Washington, D.C.; Ball State University, Indiana; Wayne State University, Detroit, Mich., and in private collections in England, Canada, Switzerland, Iran and throughout the United States.

He has worked in collaboration with such noted artists as Fritz Scholder, Earl Linderman, Lamar Briggs and Robert McCall.

One of Rezvani's most recent accomplishments was a guest artist workshop and lecture at the Tamarind Institute, University of New Mexico, which will result in publication of his new lithograph. The Detroit Institute of Art, the Tucson Museum of Art, the Palace of the Legion of Honor, San Francisco, and the Achebbach Foundation for Graphic Arts in California have recently added his work to their permanent collections.

Ruben Romero · Classical Guitarist



Ruben Romero is acclaimed as one of the world's finest guitarists. He has performed extensively throughout the United States with major orchestras including the Denver Symphony, the Minnesota Symphony and the New Mexico Symphony Orchestra.

Romero is also involved in television, recordings, films, radio and theatrical performances. He also makes guest artist appearances at colleges and schools.

His ability to excel at performing everything from intricate Bach counterpoint to Spanish Donza to improvisational jazz has earned him international recognition as a virtuoso guitarist.

Romero began playing the guitar at age ll and was self-taught until formal instruction began at age l8. His tours with a renowned flamenco dance troupe in his early years led him through the Southwest to Los Angeles, where his career began in earnest. Small concerts in California gave way to college performances and soon the native New Mexican was appearing with major symphonies in the United States. In addition to his performance and guest artist schedule, Romero has written several compositions which have been performed with full symphony in various parts of the country.

William Pitt Root · Writer



A nationally-known writer and poet, William Pitt Root has had two of his works nominated for the Pulitzer Prize, In the World's Common Grasses and Reasons for Going It On Foot. His other writings include films, chapbooks and poems. More than 300 of his poems have been published in periodicals, including the New Yorker, The Atlantic and Harpers Magazine, and in anthologies such as the New Yorker Book of Poems, New Voices in American Poetry and the Academy of American Poets Anthology.

In addition to his prolific writing, he is a highly sought after teacher and guest writer at schools across the country. He has taught writing courses at various schools including Amherst College, Interlochen Arts Academy, the University of Montana, Southwest Louisjana University and Wichita State University.

William Pitt Root received special recognition through the Dnited States/United Kingdom Bicentennial Exchange Artist Fellowship in 1978 and 1979. During his career, he has been recipient of writing grants from the National Endowment for the Arts, the Guggenheim Foundation, the Rockefeller Foundation and the Wallace Steemer Fellowship at Stanford University.

He is listed in International Artists, Writers Who's Who, the Directory of International Biography and Who's Who in America.

Roy Round · Photographer



British photographer Roy A. Round's work is seen in a wide variety of media. Particularly noted for his fashion photography, Round's photographs are also sought after in advertising, television commercials, magazines and record sleeves.

Round was born in London and started his career as an aerial photographer in the Royal Air Force (RAF). After his military service, he worked in Peter Clark's studio, where he gained great technical skill,

particularly in printing, before starting his own studio.

Round's photography has been synonymous for years with high fashion, beauty, grace and "the arts" — particularly ballet. His work has become so renowmed for intelligent portrayals of the deceptively glamorous world of dance that during the shooting of the acclaimed ballet film "The Turning Point," director Herbert Ross planned his scenes of dancers rehearsing and practising around photographs shot by Round.

He has photographed Conductor Rostropovich, Rudolf Nureyev, Andre Previn, veteran songwriter Arthur Schwartz, actor Tom Courtenay and

other notables in the world of the arts.

He photographed Queen Elizabeth II after receiving an invitation by the Royal Society of Arts to take the annual official portrait of the Queen.

Lisa Roll Dancer







Lisa Roll is a dancer and choreographer now living in Houston, where she has founded an improvisational dance ensemble. She is participating in the State Arts Council of Oklahoma's Artisto-in-Residence program, and she has toured Oklahoma, the Southwest and Great Plains as a founding member of Prairie Dance Theatre. Roll studied at the Tulsa Ballet Theatre, on scholarship at the School of American Ballet and modern dance at the Linno and Cunningham schools in New York. She has performed with the Dallas Ballet and Musical Theatre companies. For the last three summers, she has been a choreographer at the Oklahoma Trail of Tears Drama, Tsa-la-gi, in Tahlequah. Roll is a graduate of the University of Utah and is working toward a master's degree in movement from Wesleyan University in Connecticut.

Richard Bugg has been performing electronic music for 10 years. He founded in 1977 an experimental synthesizer ensemble, "Cosmic Debris."
