ABOUT THE OKLAHOMA SUMMER ARTS INSTITUTE

The Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute brings nationally respected professional artists to the state every summer to teach orchestra, acting, ballet, choral music, modern dance, photography, drawing, and creative writing to approximately 230 students between the ages of fourteen and eighteen who are chosen by competitive audition. College credit is available to Institute students through the Oklahoma Ripler education system, administered by the University of Oklahoma; and through Oklahoma (Tu Niversity.)

Our goal during the two weeks of the Institute is to offer students an opportunity to develop a heightened awareness of their own talents and abilities through a mentorship situation with professional artists in an atmosphere of artistic immersion. For some, it may encourage them to return to their hometowns as leaders in their school, and as participants in the cultural life of their communities. But for others, it may provide that necessary measure of instruction and encouragement that will motivate them to oursue a career in the art.

The Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute was incorporated as a non-profit organization in 1976 through the statewide efforts of artiste, educators and cultural leaders in response to requests from parents eseking summer arts training for their children. Under the leadership of the State Arts Council of Oklahoma in cooperation with the Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department and the Oklahoma State Department of Education, the Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute was established in 1979 at Quartz Mountain Arts and Conference Center, Lone Wolf, Oklahoma.

Today, a joint agreement exists between the Institute, and the Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department for a building program at Quartz Mountain. Construction is currently underway on a 750-seat musical performance hall at Quartz Mountain, and this summer will see the ground breaking on a new state-of the-art Arts and Conference Center to replace the old Quartz Mountain Lodge, which was largely destroyed by fire in February of 1995. For the next couple of years, while the new facilities are being completed, the Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute will be relocated to Northeastern State University in Tahlequain, Oklahoma.

The Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute is one of three programs administered by the Oklahoma Arts Institute. The Institute also administers an outreach program called "Moving the Mountain." Under this project, the Institute publishes student poetry, exhibite student art and produces educational and motivational films for use in schools. In the fall, an additional education program provides intensive arts training opportunities for adults, ages twenty-one and over. The fall Arts Institutes are a series of weekend workshops for artists and educators that provide the same caliber of instruction and varied curriculum in choral music, photography, theatre, writing and visual arts that is given to students in the summer. The Oklahoma State Department of Education provides full scholarships for Oklahoma public school teachers to attend this intensive continuing education program. The 1997 Oklahoma Fall Arts institutes will be held at Oklahoma State University, due to construction at Quartz Mountain.

The Oklahoma Arts Institute is supported by contributions and grants from individuals, corporations, foundations and government agencies. For information on Institute projects, contact the administrative office in Oklahoma City.

WHAT HAPPENS DAILY

ARTS INSTITUTE ON-SITE ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICE

Professional artists of national reputation teach at the Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute. Classes are small to ensure interaction between students and faculty artists. Living and working with the artists allows personal direction as well as encouragement, inspiration and the development of skills. Time is set aside each afternoon for interdisciplinary work or individual study.

CONVERSATIONS WITH THE ARTISTS

6:15 - 7:00 p.m.

Each evening, through informal dialogue with members of the faculty, students gain insight into the lives of these professional artists who frankly discuss frustrations, career plateaus and achievements.

ELECTIVES

8:15 - 9:30 p.m.

Each student is required to choose one of two electives offered by faculty artists each evening when there are no performances. This diversification gives students the opportunity to particlpate in art forms other than the one they are studying.

SPECIAL EVENTS

ORIGINS OKLAHOMA 1997: CHEROKEE TRADITIONS

In 1991 the Institute inaugurated an ongoing humanities project called "Origine Oklahoma." Each year the project examines the cultural and historical contributions of a different cultural or ethnic group within the state. This year, in honor of our residency in Tahlequain, the capitol of the Cherokee Nation, the Origins Oklahoma project will focus on the history and culture of the Cherokee people. With the assistance of the Cherokee Nation's Cultural Department, there will be a "Cherokee Traditions" seminar series during the first week of the Institute. On Monday through Thursday at 1:00, different Cherokee artisans will come and give 45-minute presentation/demonstrations of their craft and history. Cherokee Traditions will be held in the NET auditorium. Check your daily schedule for details.

GALLERIES

The Cafeteria in the University Center will house an exhibition of photographs, prints and paintings by this summer's visual art and photography faculty. In the University Center lobby the "Bio-board" will display the photos and bios of all faculty and staff at the 1997 Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute. In addition, each day a new Poem, Drawing and Photo of the Day will be displayed here. At the beginning of the final "Onstage" Weekend, the Redbud Room on the University Center's second floor will house the student drawing and photo exhibition. A special opening event will take place at 5:00 p.m. on Friday, June 20.

CHAMBER MUSIC: EINE KLEINE QUARTZMUSIK

On the first Tuesday, and second Tuesday and Thursday evenings, faculty musicians perform in chamber groups of voice, brass, woodwind, percussion and string ensembles. These concerts begin at 8:15 on the first Tuesday and at 7:15 p.m.the second Tuesday and Thursday in the Performing Arts Center. All concerts are free and open to the public.

ORCHESTRA AND CHORUS CONCERTS

On the first Friday evening at 8:15, and on the final Saturday afternoon, the Institute Chorus presents a concert in the Performing Arts Center. Each Wednesday and Saturday evening, the Institute Orchestra presents a concert of major repertoire under the batons of nationally known conductors. These concerts are free and open to the public.

RECEPTIONS

On Wednesdays, Fridays, and Saturdays after concerts and performances, Northeastern State University and the Oklahoma Arts Institute hosts receptions honoring the performers. Receptions are held in the food court, downstairs in the University Center.

GUEST ARTISTS

Guest artists enrich the curriculum at the Oklahoma Gummer Arts Institute and provide special Insights into the arts through lecture demonstrations, workshops, student critiques and master classes. Guest Artists in 1997 will include guest alumni Shari Little (ballet, 1977), and Kathryn Sleeper (bassoon, 1977), as well as painter and printmaker Charles Banks Wilson and actor/playwright Joe Sears.

FACULTY SHOWCASE

On the first Thursday night, the students will see the acting, dance and poetry faculty perform in the Faculty Onstage Showcase.

DONORS WEEKEND

Each year, the Institute invites its Board Members, Quartz Crystal Club Members and their quests to visit classes, enjoy a special dinner and attend an orchestra concert. Students will be seated with guests at dinner, and will have an opportunity to meet and talk with some of the people who have made the Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute possible.

SUNDAY CELEBRATION OF THE SPIRIT

Celebration of the Spirit, a non-denominational spiritual offering on the middle Sunday morning, is always a very special event. Students join faculty in celebrating our spirituality and taking a moment during the Institute to reflect and offer thanks. This year's Celebration of the Spirit will be held in honor and memory of Duane Carter and Ellen Woods Westheimer.

ACTING

IAMES DEPAUL, MILWAUKEE, WI

James DePaul, now in his first season as Director of the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee's Professional Theatre Training Program and Artistic Director of the Northern Stage Company, is an internationally-acclaimed director and teacher of acting. Before coming to the UWM, he was the Director of Undergraduate Studies in Theatre at Yale University and taught acting at the Yale School of Drama. While at the Drama School he mentored with Earle Gister, Associate Dean and Head of Acting. Mr. DePaul has also taught at Southern Methodist University and Oberlin College, serving as Head of Acting and Directing and as the Artistic Director of the Oberlin Repertory Company (which included among its performers Patrick Stewart and Lisa Harrow.) As founder and director of the professional New Place Theatre Company in New Haven, Connecticut, Mr. DePaul has toured Edinburgh, Paris, Amsterdam, Warsaw and Barcelona. Mr. DePaul has served as a site evaluator for the National Endowment for the Arts for the past six years and has visited over forty professional theatre companies in the United States. He has taught over 300 master classes in the United States and abroad. He and his colleague, Michael Johnson-Chase, have been invited to perform master classes this May at the Shanghai Drama Academy in the People's Republic of China, as well as in Australia and New Zealand. Mr. DePaul is a member of the Society of Stage Directors and Choreographers and Actors Equity Association.

VOICE & MOVEMENT

IRENE CONNORS, VALENCIA, CALIFORNIA

Irene Connors is Associate Dean of the School of Theatre, Director of Programs in Performance and a member of the voice faculty at the California Institute of the Arts. She has varied acting experience in classical and modern drama, and in musical theatre. Connors earned her M.S. from the University of Michigan. In 1996 and 1997, Connors was the voice coach for the American College Theatre's Actor's Showcase in New York and Los Angeles theatres. Connors is a member of the Los Angeles Repertory Company as an actress. Most recently, Connors directed W.B. Yeats' <u>Deirdre</u>, an interdisciplinary project involving the schools of art, music, dance and theatre at Califorts. This production was subsequently produced at the Edinburgh Theatre Festival in August of 1996.

BALLET

GALINA SOLOVEVA, MOSCOW, RUSSIA

Galina Soloveva, a Moscow resident and Russian citizen, is a graduate of the Bolehoi Academy School in Moscow. Upon graduation, she accepted an invitation to perform with the Bolshoi Ballet Troupe and performed throughout the world as a member of the company. Two years of pedagogical study at the Bolshoi Academy School, following her performing career, as well as an additional five years at the Academy of Thetre Arts in Moscow, working with Marina Semonova, increased her knowledge of professional teaching and earned her the diploma of Master Teacher. Since 1985, she has been teaching at the Bolshoi Academy in Moscow, and has taught at the Bolshoi Ballet Academy Schools in Tokyo, Japan and in Vall Colorado. This is Ms. Soloveva's second residency with the Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute.

CHORAL MUSIC FIRST WEEK CONDUCTOR: JERRY MCCOY, STILLWATER, OK

Dr. Jerry McCoy is Director of Choral Activities, Vocal Area Coordinator, and Professor of Music at Oklahoma State University. Dr. McCoy has conducted honor choirs and performance clinics in fourteen states and has presented sessions on choral literature for many levels of the American Choral Directors Association. In July and August of 1937 he will serve as guest conductor for the renowned Santa Fe Desert Chorale in Earnat Fe, New Mexico. He is currently serving ACDA as national chairman of the College and University Repertoire and Standards Committee. His writings on choral music have been published in the <u>Choral Journal Common Times</u>, and the newsletter of Oklahoma Choral Directors Association. In addition, he is editor of a new series of choral music for Santa Barbara Music Company. Dr. McCoy holds advanced degrees in choral conducting from the University of Texas at Austin. He has studied in conductor exchange programs in Venezuela (1995), Sweden (1993), and Germany (1988). He has sung and recorded with the Institut de Robert Shaw Festival Singers in New York City and throughout southern France, and with the Banff Festival Chamber Choir led by world famous Swediels conductor Eric Ericson.

SECOND WEEK CONDUCTOR: PATRICK GARDNER, NEW BRUNSWICK, NJ

Now in his seventh season as Director of the Kiverside Choral Society, Patrick Gardner is also the Director of Choral Activities and the Director of the Graduate Choral Conducting program at Rutgers University, Previously, Gardner has served on the conducting faculties of the University of Michigan and the University of Texas at Austin. He has twice been a member of the conductor's seminar at Tanglewood. He received his doctorate in choral conducting from the University of Texas at Austin in 1981. Gardner has conducted over 60 major choral works with orchestra in the past 10 years. He has prepared choruses for the Detroit Symphony, the Austin Symphony, and a presentation of the Berlioz Requiem conducted by Robert Shaw. Gardner has conducted and lectured in 30 states, Canada, and the Bahamas and has presented concerts in thirteen European countries, including performances at the Mozarteum in Salzburg and the Glinka Cappella at the Hermitage in St. Petersburg, Ruseia. He has conducted All State and All Region choirs throughout the United States, including this past year's New Jersey All State And All Region choirs throughout the United States, including this past year's New Jersey All State And All Region choirs throughout the United States, including this past year's New Jersey All States Choir.

VISUAL ARTS DANIEL KIACZ, NORMAN, OK

Dan Kiacz came to the University of Oklahoma in 1973 with a BFA and an MFA from Ohlo University, His area of expertise is Printmaking with special emphasis in Serigraphy; his classes also include Lithography and Etching. Since 1973, his work has appeared in over 200 international, national and regional exhibitions including Boston Printmakers, Wesleyan International, "Colorprint U.S.A." and the United States Information Agency Touring Print Invitational, While at the University of Oklahoma, Professor Klacz received entry into the British Specialist Printmaking Program and pursued a year of study in England. In 1991 he was a Visiting Professor at Universidad Autonoma de Guadalajara in Guadalajara, Neduco. Professor Klacz also presents annual courses in both Santa Fe, New Mexico and New York, New York. A recipient of numerous teaching awards, in 1992 he received both the Outstanding Faculty Award, College of Fine Arts, and the Oklahoma State Regents Award for Higher Education. Dan Kiacz taught printmaking and rawing at the first Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute at Camp Egan in Tahlequah in 1977, and has assisted with the Printmaking program of the Oklahoma Fall Arts Institutes for 13 years. He serves as a member of the Oklahoma Arts Institute's Visual Arts Advisory Panel.

MODERN DANCE DERRICK MINTER, NEW YORK, NY

Derrick Minter, born in Los Angeles and raised in Oklahoma, trained at the Alvin Alley American Dance Center and has performed with such companies as the Alvin Alley Repertory Ensemble, the Martha Graham Ensemble, and Joseph Holmes Chicago Dance Theater as well as working with choreographers such as Tailey Beatty and Milton Meyers, Kevin lega and Louis Johnson. Derrick has appeared at Carnegie Hall with George Benson and Maya Angelou. Also in Vennette Carroll's "Your Arms Too Ghort To Box with God" where he played Jesus. Mr. Minter holds a B.F.A. in Modern Pedagogy and Journalism. He has been a guest artist in China, Japan and Australia.

ORCHESTRA FIRST WEEK CONDUCTOR: KATE TAMARKIN, ROCKWALL, TX

Associate Conductor of the Dallas Symphony from 1989 to 1994, Kate Tamarkin is currently Music Director of the Vermont Symphony Orchestra and the East Texas Symphony Orchestra. Among her recent performances as a guest conductor have been debuts with the Tucson, Billings, St. Louis, Houston, Nashville, Phoenix, and New Mexico Symphonies. Other quest conducting engagements have included the Grant Park, San Diego, Albany, Fresno, and Pacific Symphonies, the Pro Arte Chamber Orchestra of Columbus, Ohio, and the Tulsa Philharmonic with quest artists Doc Severinsen and Marvin Hamlisch. Ms. Tamarkin was chosen to conduct the Chicago Symphony as part of the American Conductors Program with Leonard Bernstein in 1988 and was a winner in the Association of Professional Vocal Ensembles National Conducting Competition in 1987. She has been a Conducting Fellow at Tanglewood, the Aspen Music Festival, the Los Angeles Philharmonic Institute, and she studed abroad at the Accademia Musicale Chiqiana in Siena, Italy. Ms. Tamarkin was the Music Director of the Fox Valley Symphony Orchestra in Appleton, Wisconsin from 1982 to 1990, and presented the premiere of numerous works by contemporary composers. Kate Tamarkin received a Bachelor of Music Education degree from Chapman University, and her Master of Music degree from Northwestern University, which recently awarded her the Alumni Merit Award for her achievements in music. She holds the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the Peabody Conservatory of Music.

SECOND WEEK CONDUCTOR:

THOMAS M. SIEEPER, MIAMI, FL

A native of Wagoner. Oklahoma, Thomas Sleeper received his Bachelor's degree in music education at the University of Texas at Austin. At age 22, he was appointed Associate Conductor of the Dallas Civic Symphony and the SMU Chamber Orchestra and Opera Theater. He earned his Master of Music degree in conducting at Meadows School of the Arts, Southern Methodist University, Dallas. An active guest conductor in the U.S. and abroad, he has appeared with the Ruse State Philharmonic Orchestra (Bulgaria), Central Philharmonic Orchestra of China, the San Juan (Argentina) Symphony Orchestra, the Central Florida Symphony Orchestra, the Savannah Symphony Orchestra, the Dallas Symphony Orchestra and the China-Whian Symphony, as well as others, and has premiered the works of many composers, among them; Henry Brant, Carlos Surinach and Thomas Ludwig. His own compositions have been performed throughout the USA and in Europe, Asia, and South America and his Pigna Quartet 1931 Dunsquipi was commissioned and recorded by the Dunsmuir Quartet. Awards include a fellowship at the Atlantic Center of the Arts and various grants for composition, most recently for a work commemorating the 1935 bombing in Oklahoma City and also for Acceldang a dramatic work about the Holocaust in conjunction with

artist Joe Nicastri. Sleeper currently resides in Miami, Florida, where he is Associate Professor of Music at the University of Miami School of Music and the Director of Orchestral Activities and Conductor of the University of Miami Symphony Orchestra and Opera Theater.

He has received two 1984 and 1994 Los Angeles Dramalogue Awards for his writing and performance; three Helen Hayes nominations for his Washington D.C. work in theatre; and two Command Performances for President and Mrs. Bush at the White House. Mr. Sears and Mr. Williams are currently working on their third Tuna play called <u>Red White and Tuna</u> to open in Dallas this fall. Their new comic opera, <u>Ochelata's Wedding</u> will premiere at the 1998 OK Mozart International Festival

CHARLES BANKS WILSON PAINTER / PRINTMAKER: FAYETTEVILLE, AR

Few other artists have become so identified with their state as Oklahoma's Charles Banks Wilson. Painter, printmaker, magazine and book illustrator, teacher, lecturer and historian, his work has been shown in over 200 exhibitions in this country and throughout the world. The permanent collections of major museums and galleries contain his paintings and prints of Oklahoma life. These include New York's Metropolitan and Washington's Library of Congress, Corocarn Gallery and the Smithsonian.

Author and editor of a standard work on the Indian Tribes of Eastern Oklahoma, he is also the Illustrator of 22 books and has done pictures for many more. Besides the Oklahoma Press Association's portrait of "Will Rogers, Wilson also did the life portrait of 'Thomas Gilcrease who established Tulsa's Gilcrease Museum. His famous sitters include U.S. House Speaker Carl Albert. Four mural-sized portraits of Will Rogers, Sequoyah, U.S. Senator Robert Kerr and Jim Thorpe are viewed annually by one million visitors to the Oklahoma State capitol rotunda. The Oklahoma painter is best known for his pictures of contemporary Indian life, a project which has engaged him since the early 30's.

Honored by the U.S. State Department as well as the international Institute of Arts and Letters in Geneva, Charles Banks Wilson receive the first Governor's Art Award and the D.S.C. from the University of Oklahoma. He is a member of the Oklahoma Hall of Fame and recipient of thehe Western Heritaga award from the Cowboy Hall of Fame. Mr. Wilson created the designs for the "First Americans Series," Basait medallions depicting famous Indian Chiefs, produced by Josiah Wedgwood and Sons, linc. England. His major undertaking has been the preparation of of four murals totalling 110 feet in length for the Oklahoma Capitol rotunda presenting the state's discovery, frontier trade, Indian liminisation and settlement.

Shari Little began her training with Yvonne Chouteau in Oklahoma City.
