ABOUT THE OKLAHOMA SUMMER ARTS INSTITUTE

The Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute brings nationally respected professional artists to the state every summer to teach orchestra, acting, ballet, choral music, modern dance, photography, drawing, and creative writing to approximately 240 students between the ages of fourteen and eighteen who are chosen by competitive audition. College credit is available to Institute students through the Oklahoma higher education system, administered by the University of Oklahoma; and through Oklahoma City University.

Our goal during the two weeks of the Institute is to offer students an apportunity to develop a heightened awareness of their own talents and abilities through a mentor-slip situation with professional artists in an atmosphere of artistic immersion. For some, it may encourage them to return to their hometowns as leaders in their school, and as participants in the cultural life of their communities. But for others, it may provide that necessary measure of instruction and encouragement that will motivate them to pursue a career in the arts.

The Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute was incorporated as a non-profit organization in 1976 through the statewide efforts of artists, educators and cultural leaders in response to requests from parents seeking summer arts training for their children. Under the leadership of the Arts Council of Oklahoma in cooperation with the Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department and the Oklahoma State Department of Education, the Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute was established in 1978 at Quartz Mountain Arts and Conference Center, Lone Wolf, Oklahoma.

Today, a joint agreement exists between the Institute and the Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department for a building program at Quartz Mountain. Construction is currently underway on a 750-seat musical performance hall at Quartz Mountain, and this summer will see the ground breaking on a new state-of the art Arts and Conference Center to replace the old Quartz Mountain Lodge, which was largely destroyed by fire in February of 1995. For the next couple of years, while the new facilities are being completed, the Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute will be relocated to the University of Oklahoma in Norman, Oklahoma.

The Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute is one of three programs administered by the Oklahoma Arts Institute. The Institute also administers an outread program called "Moving the Mountain." As part of this project, the Institute publishes student poetry, exhibits student art and produces educational and motivational films for use in schools. In the fall, an additional education program provides intensive arts training opportunities for adults, ages twenty-one and over. The Fall Arts institutes are a series of weekend workshops for artists and educators that provide the same caliber of instruction and varied curriculum in choral music, photography, theatre, writing and visual arts that is given to students in the summer. The Oklahoma State Department of Education provides full scholarships for Oklahoma public school teachers to attend this intensive continuing education program. The 1938 Oklahoma Fall Arts Institutes will be held at Oklahoma State University, due to construction at Quartz Mountain.

The Oklahoma Arts Institute is supported by contributions and grants from individuals, corporations, foundations and government agencies. For information on institute projects, contact the administrative office in Oklahoma City.

WHAT HAPPENS DAILY ARTS INSTITUTE ON-SITE ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICE

Professional artists of national reputation teach at the Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute. Classes are small to ensure interaction between students and faculty artists. Living and working with the artists allows personal direction as well as encouragement, inspiration and the development of skills. Time is set aside each afternoon for interdisciplinary work or individual study.

6:30 - 7:15 p.m.

Each evening, through informal dialogue with members of the faculty, students gain insight into the lives of these professional artists, who frankly discuss frustrations, career plateaus and achievements.

ARTS TALK

8:15 - 9:30 p.m.

Each student is required to choose one of two electives offered by faculty artists each evening when there are no performances. This diversification gives students the opportunity to participate in art forms other than the one they are studying.

1998 FACULTY

ACTING CRAIG BELKNAP, VALENCIA, CA

Craig Belknap is a professional theatre director with extensive credits nationally and internationally, let has been the recipient of an NEA award as well as a national directing award in Japan. His theatre company, Direct Theatre, launched the careers of such renowned playwrights as Christopher Durang, Albert Innaurato, and Dennis Molityre, as well as actress Sigourney Weaver. He directed Doogle Howere M.D. for television, and his first film Traveler's Rest was invited to international film festivals in Edinburgh, Montreal, Australia, Chicago, Hawaii, Nav York, Cairo, Leeds, San Francisco, Palm Springs, and Cork. Traveler's Rest received the gold medal at the Worldfest International Film Festival in Houston, first place gold medal for best short film in the Philafilm Arts and Sciences Award nominations, and was selected to screen in the Director's Guild of America Film Society in both Los Angeles and New York. Belknap received an ACE Award nomination as one of the creators of Showtime television's dramatic series, The Thirty Minute Movie. He is set to direct his screenplay Cooking in Hell's Kitchen, an independent feature about the thetaet. He is also a faculty member at the California Institute of the Arts. He returns to the University of Oklahoma campus after directing the Hollweight of Civil Alamon avinial production "Jack" in 1932.

VOICE AND MOVEMENT IRENE CONNORS, VALENCIA, CA

liene Connors is Associate Dean of the School of Theatre, Director of Programs in Ferformance and a member of the voice faculty at the California institute of the Arts. She has varied acting experience in classical and modern drama, and in musical theatre. Connors garned her M.S. from the University of Michigan. In 1986 and 1987, Connors was the voice coach for the American College Theatre's Actor's Showcase in New York and Los Angeles theatres. Connors is a member of the Los Angeles Repertory Company as an actress. Most recently, Connors directed W.B. Yeats' <u>Peirdre</u>, an interdisciplinary project involving the schools of art, music, dance and theatre at CalArts. This production was subsequently produced at the Edithurgh Theatre Festival in August of 1996.

BALLET DONALD DADEY, PHOENIX, ARIZONA

Donald Dadey's 23-year career in dance began at age 15, with training at the Pittsburgh Ballet Theatre School and Pittsburgh Playhouse with Jean Gedeon and John Occupinti. After studies with Edward Caton, he was accepted on full scholarship to the School of American Ballet where he completed his training under Stanley Williams, Richard Rapp, and Antonia Tumkovsky. He has danced professionally with Pittsburgh Ballet Theatre, Chicago Lyric Opera Ballet, Dallas Ballet and as a guest artist with Nevada Dance Theatre. He spent 10 years with the Zurich Ballet in Switzer-land under the direction of George Balanchine and Patricia Neary. With that company he danced lead roles in several ballets by Mr. Balanchine, and worked with choreographers William Forsythe, Robert North, and Christopher Bruce. In 1986 he joined Ballet Anzona as Principal Dancer and danced all leading male roles with that company until his retirement in 1992. He became the Associate Artistic Director in 1995 and his choreographic credits include "Vivaldi's Suspicion;" "Ghost Town." The Wolf After John," and "Centamer Dances."

CHORAL MUSIC FIRST WEEK CONDUCTOR WESTON NOBLE, DECORAH, IOWA

Weston Noble, now celebrating his fiftieth year as conductor of the Nordic Choir of Luther College, Decorah, IA., is an internationally known conductor and clinician. He has served as guest conductor of over 800 music festivals in 48 states, Canada, Europe, Australia, and South America. More than 50 all-state choruses, bands, and orchestras have been under his direction. In 1989 he was named the Outstanding Music Educator of the United States by the National Federation of High School Associations. He was the first recipient of this national citation. He annually makes 25 to 30 appearances from coast to coast as festival director, clinician or adjudicator. He has conducted either Luther College organizations or festival groups in Orchestra Hall, Chicago; Town Hall, Carnegie Hall, and Lincoln Center, New York; Kennedy Center, Washington D.C.; Bolshoi, The Kremlin, and Tschaikowsky Hall, Moscow, Franz Listz Academy, Budapest; and the Mommon Tabernacle in Salt Lake City among many others. In 1994, he was the first recipient of the Weston Noble Award, presented by the North Central Division of the American Choral Directors Association, "in recognition of Lifetime Achievement in the Choral Art." Weston Noble is the Honorary Chairman of the 1999 America International Singing Fest for Men and Boys to be held in Collegeville, MN and Desemblines. I

CHORAL MUSIC SECOND WEEK CONDUCTOR STEVEN CURTIS, NORMAN, OKLAHOMA

Steven Curtis is a Professor of Music at the University of Oklahoma, where he directs the University Choir and Chamber Ensemble and teaches choral conducting and vocal music education methods classes. He is in his fourteenth year at the University of Oklahoma, and has been both adjudicating and conducting extensively in the Midwest and Southwest. In April 1995, he conducted the Delaware All State Unior Choir, and in early 1999 he will conduct the Arkansas All State Meris Chorus. He is a specialist in training young choirs and is interested in the development of the boy's changing voice. His university choirs have performed at state, regional, and national music conventions. Curtis was named Director of Distinction by the Oklahoma Choral Directors Association in 1996. In 1997, he led a European tour of University of Oklahoma choral music students, performing in nine cities in Germany, Nustria and the Czech Republic.

DRAWING AND PAINTING ROBERT RAHWAY ZAKANITCH

Robert Rahway Zakanitch returns to OSAI for his fourth year as Drawing and Painting instructor. He has been showing his work in New York since 1968, and has been described by Art in America as "Pattern and Decoration painter with residual, almost invisible links to Minimalism and Pop art." His acrylic paintings focus on patterns, ornamentation, and objects, brought to life in wivid color. An exhibition of his work, "Larger Than Life: Big Bungalow Suite" is currently on display in the Fred Jones Jr. Museum of Art. This show features INSO ft. paintings of rich vegetation and patterns. They bear his trademark flowing brushwork, reflecting the domestic interiors of his childhood--floral rugs, painted plates and patterned linoleum floors. Zakanitch was one of the leaders of the Fattern and Decoration movement in the 1970s. This informal group of artists challenged the prevailing aseithetic of cool, austere abstraction with works that evoked nature's abundance and the Joy of painting. His paintings are included in many public and private collections, including Chase Manhattan Bank, New York; Hirshorn Museum and Sculpture Garden, Washington, D.C.; and the Whitney Museum of American Art. New York.

MODERN DANCE DERRICK MINTER, NEW YORK, NEW YORK

Derrick Minter, born in Los Angeles and raised in Oklahoma, trained at the Alvin Alley American Dance Center and has performed with such companies as the Alvin Alley Repertory Ensemble, the Martha Graham Ensemble, and Joseph Holmes Chicago Dance Theater as well as working with choreographers such as Talley Beatty and Milton Meyers, Kevin lega and Louis Johnson. He is currently a company member of the Alvin Alicy Dance Theater. Derrick has appeared at Carnegle Hall with George Benson and Maya Angelou, and in Atlantic City with Aretha Franklin. He was also in Vennette Carrollis "Your Arms Too Short To Box with God" where he played Jesus. Mr. Minter holds a B.F.A. in Modern Pedagogy and Journalism. He has visited numerous institutions as a guest artist, including the National Dance Institute, the Alvin Alley Camp, and the American Dance Festival. His international workshops include those held in Holland, China, Japan and Australia.

ORCHESTRA FIRST WEEK CONDUCTOR: THOMAS SLEEPER, MIAMI, FLORIDA

A native of Wagoner, Oklahoma, Thomas Sleeper received his Bachelor's degree in music education at the University of Texas at Austin. At age 22, he was appointed Associate Conductor of the Dallas Civic Symphony and the SMU Chamber Orchestra and Opera Theater. He earned his Master of Music degree in conducting at Meadows School of the Arts, Southern Methodist University, Dallas. An active quest conductor in the U.S. and abroad, he has appeared with the Ruse State Philharmonic Orchestra (Bulgaria), Central Philharmonic Orchestra of China, the San Juan (Argentina) Symphony Orchestra, the Central Florida Symphony Orchestra, the Savannah Symphony Orchestra, the Dallas Symphony Orchestra and the China-Wuhan Symphony, as well as others, and has premiered the works of many composers, including those by Henry Brant, Carlos Surinach and Thomas Ludwig. His own compositions have been performed throughout the USA and in Europe, Asia, and South America and his Piano Quartet 1991 (Dunsmuir) was commissioned and recorded by the Dunsmuir Quartet. Awards include a fellowship at the Atlantic Center of the Arts and various grants for composition, most recently for a work commemorating the 1995 bombing in Oklahoma City and also for Aceldama, a dramatic work about the Holocaust in conjunction with artist Joe Nicastri. Sleeper currently resides in Miami, Florida, where he is Associate Professor of Music at the University of Miami School of Music and the Director of Orchestral Activities and Conductor of the University of Miami Symphony Orchestra and Opera Theater.

SECOND WEEK CONDUCTOR: TIMOTHY RUSSELL, TEMPE, ARIZONA

Timothy Russell became Professor of Music and the Director of Orchestras at Arizona State University in 1933, after teaching and conducting at Ohio State University and the University of Rochester's Eastman School of Music. He has established himself as one of America's most versatile conductors, foremost music educators, and outstanding record producers. His nine recordings have been enthusiastically received by listeners and orbitos. Equally at home conducting the great symphonic literature, music for chamber orchestra, large choral works, pope concerts, and children's programs, he is a frequent guest conductor with the Phoenix Symphony. Other recent guest conducting appearances have included the Hawaii Symphony Orchestra, Baltimore Chamber Orchestra, South Dakota Symphony, and the Pittsburgh New Music Ensemble. He has recently completed his nineteenth season as Director of the ProMusica Chamber Orchestra of Columbus, Ohio. ProMusica has earned an outstanding reputation for artislitic performances and exciting programming. ASCAP has honored Russell and ProMusica for outstanding service to contemporary music.

PHOTOGRAPHY CHRISTOPHER JAMES, BOSTON, MASSACHUSETTS

Christopher James is an internationally known artist and photographer whose paintings and photographs have been exhibited in galleries and museums in this country and abroad. His work has been published and exhibited extensively, including shows in the Museum of Modern Art, the Metropolitan Museum of Art, Eastman House and galleries including Witkin, Weston and Lizardi/Harp. Christopher was Department Chair and taught for 13 years at Harvard University in the Department of Visual and Environmental Studies. He is currently Department Chair at the Art Institute of Boston. As well, Christopher is a professional SCUBA diver and the Creative Director of Zephyr Graphics, a multi-service graphic design agency specializing in corporate identities. Christopher taught Alternative Printing Techniques at the 1995 Oklahoma Fall Arts Institutes for adultitutes for

PHOTOGRAPHY DARKROOM TECHNIQUE KONRAD EEK, OKLAHOMA CITY, OK

Konrad Eek received his Bachelors of Fine Arts degree from the University of Oklahoma in 1988. He has exhibited in numerous one-person and group shows, and his work appears in the permanent collection of Fred Jones Memorial Art. Museum at the University of Oklahoma, and in the Midwest Photography Archives. For four years, he worked as Production Manager of Steven Michael Studios, a catalogue studio in Dallas. Currently, he is Director of Photography at RG.I. LL.C. in Oklahoma City. Konrad has taught Darkroom Technique at the Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute for many years, and taught the Beginning Photography workshop at the 1996 and 1997 Oklahoma Fall Arts Institutes.

POETRY

RUTH SCHWARTZ, OAKLAND, CALIFORNIA

Ruth Schwartz returns to OSAI for a second year as poetry instructor. She was born in Geneva, New York and spend her childhood moving around the country. Upon graduation from Wesleyan University in 1993 she received a fellowship to attend the University of Michigan Creative Writing Program. She received her M.FA. from that program in 1985. In the same year, she moved to the San Francisco Bay area, still her chosen home, and began work at the San Francisco AIDS Foundation. She has continued to work in the field of health education since that time. Ruth's literary awards include the Nimmod/Pablo Neruda Frize (1991), the New Letter Literary Award (1991), the Americas Review Poetry Contest (1992), fellowships from both the Astagas Foundation (1992) and the National Endowment for the Arts (1933), the North Carolina Writers' Network Award (1993) and the Chelesa Magazine literary contest (1994). Her first book of poetry, Accordion Breathing and Dancing was published by the University of Pittsburgh Frees in 1996, and her poems and non-fiction have appeared in numerous literary journals and anthololgies. She currently lives in Oakland, California. In 1998, her poems have been published in the Mariboro Review, Ploughshares and other journals.

SCULPTURE

PAUL MOORE, NORMAN, OKLAHOMA

Paul Moore is an Oklahoma native and member of the Creek nation. He is currently an artist-inresidence at the University of Oklahoma. In April, 1936, he completed the installation of a 34-foot long sculpture for Duncan, Oklahoma entitled "On the Chisholm Trail." His work has been collected by the National Portrait Callery in Washington D.C. and numerous municipal, corportate, private and international institutions.

VOICE FACULTY

ANNE DAWSON, VOICE INSTRUCTOR, OKLAHOMA CITY, OKLAHOMA

Anne is a native Missourian who has taught in Oklahoma for the past nine years. After receiving her Banchelor of Music Education degree from Northeast Missouri State University in 1985, she entered the Masters degree program at the University of Oklahoma. She received a degree in Yocal Performance in 1985. Anne taught in the Weatherford Public School system for four years, and will begin her elighth year as Vocal Music Director at Westmoore High School in Moore. In addition to her public shool duties, she has a studio of private voice students, and appears as a soloist with such groups as the Canterbury Choril Society and various community and church choirs.

HEATHER LANNERS, ACCOMPANIST, VOICE INSTRUCTOR: STILLWATER

Heather Shea Lanners received her Backelors Degree in Piano Ferformance from the University of Western Ontario in London, Canada. She then continued her studies in Paris with French pianist Cacile Gusset. While in Paris she also carned the Diplome Superieur en Musique de Chambre at the Ecole Normale de Musique. Since the completion of a Masters Degree in Piano Ferformance and Literature with Barry Snyder at the Eastman School of Music, Ms. Lanners has worked as the Opera Coach at both the Cleveland Institute of Music and the University of Akron. Some of her professional engagements have included performing regularly as the planist for the Cleveland Opera Tour, and as a resident pianist for the restigious Meadowmount School of Music String Camp. Heather has performed extensively throughout the United States, Canada and Europe in both solo plano and chamber music. She has performed in public master classes for such artists as Jean Barr, Natalia Antonova, and Kobert Gilverman. In the summer of 1996 she was invited with full scholarship to participate in the Holland Summer Music Sessions, where she performed daily in public master classes and recitals located in and around Amsterdam. Currently Ms. Lanners is a Professor of Piano at Oklahoma State University.

INSTRUMENTAL FACULTY

MARGARET COOPER, VIOLIN; ITHACA, N.Y.

Margaret Cooper received both her B.S. and M.M. degrees from Indiana University. She is currently on the faculty of the Ithaca College School of Music and a member of the Ariadne Guartet in residence at Ithaca College. She is a member of the Cayuga Chamber Orchestra, the Chautauqua Symphony Orchestra, and is the Concertmaster of the Fredonia Chamber Players. She also plays with the Syracuse Symphony, the Northeastern Pennsylvania Philiparmonic, and the Binghamton Symphony Orchestra. She appears occasionally as a country fiddler with Adirondack singer / songwriter Dan Berggren, and with the folkfiddle group "Daughters of Sweden".

JEFFERY COWEN, VIOLA; TULSA

Jeffery Cowen is an alumni of the Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute. He has just completed his sixth season as Principal Violist for the Tulsa Philiammonic Orchestra and will return this summer for his third season as Principal Violist with the Preckennidge Nusic Institute. An Cowen's other orchestral experiences include playing in the North Carolina and Winston-Salem Symphonies and in the Alexander Schneider String Seminar orchestra, where he participated in performances at Carnegie Hall and the Kennedy Center. As a former member of the Giannini String Quiette, Jeffery Derformed

in the Master Classes of the Guamari and Orford String Quartets and also worked extensively with Zoltan Szekely, former first violinist of the Hungarian String Quartet. Mr. Cowen has performed as soloist with the Tulsa Philharmonic, the BMI Festival Orchestra, the Northeastern Oklahoma Symphony and the North Carolina School of the Arts Symphony Orchestra.

JOHN GALM, PERCUSSION; BOULDER, COLORADO

John Galm is an Associate Professor of Music at the University of Colorado, Boulder. He earned his Bachelor's and Master's degrees of Music and has played with the United States Air Force Band and Orchestra, Baltimore Symphony, Denver Symphony Orchestra and the Colorado Festival Orchestra. His special awards include a citation from the University of Madras, India, in 1985. In 1992 he spent several months on sabbatical researching the "talking drum" in West Africa. He is currently Director of Ethnomusicology at the University of Colorado. In 1996 he began work researching the Bodhran traditional drum in Ireland.

LISA IOTINNI-WAGNER, OBOE, GLENPOOL, OKLAHOMA

Lisa lottini-Wagner earned her bachelor's degree in oboe from the University of Southern California in 1984 where she was a student of William Criss, and her master's degree from the University of Colorado at Boulder in 1988. She has been on the faculties of Oklahoma State University and Tulsa University. DONALD HALL, POET: DANBURY, NEW HAMPSHIRE

For more than fortyyears Donald Hall has been a strong presence in the literary life of the United States. One of our foremost men of letters, he is the author of fourteen books of verse, four plays and twenty-two books of prose. As a student at Exteter, Havard, Oxford, and Stanford, his mentors included Robert Frost, Archibald MacLeish, T.S. Eliot, Dylan Thomas, Yvor Winters, and Ezra Pound (all of whom he deplicted in later prose portraits.) He was poetry editor of the Paris Review, taught for two decades at the University of Michigan, and became not only an acclaimed poet but a prolific and influential anthologist and editor.

After years of academic life, marriage, and parenthood, he altered his life by giving up his professorship and returning to the ancestral famin New Hampshire that his mother's family had lived in forover a hundred years. There, remarried to the poet Jane Kenyon, Hall turned to supporting himself by writing and found a new poetle voice in such book as Kicking the Leaves, The Happy Man, and The

Museum of Clear Ideas. He continued to write criticism and edit anthologies and other publications, and to write such memoirs as Seasons At Eagle Pond and Life Work.

Donald Hall's work has been published in dozens of national publications including The New Yorker. Esquire, Sports Illustrated, the New York Times, and the Boston Review. He has appeared on over 60 broadcasts in the United States and Great Britain including poetry readings, criticisms and interviews. In the past 40 years he has read his poems over four thousand times at more than 1500 colleges, universities, schools, art centers, and other institutions. He has received numerous awards including the Sarah Josepha Hale Award, the National Book Critics Circle Award, the Los Angeles Times Book Award, the New England Book Award received the Robert Frost Silver Medal from the Fostry Soletty of America, been appointed to the National Council on the Arts, been elected to the American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters, and was Foet Laureate of New Hampshire for six years. His latest book of poetry, Without, was published by Houghton Mifflin in April of this year.

FELICIA MOYE, VIOLIN; MIAMI, FLORIDA/NORMAN

Felicia Moye attended the Juilliard School Pre-College Division and went on to receive her Bachelors and Masters degrees in Music Performance from the school. 
