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About the Summer Arts Institute

The Okhhoma Summer Arts Institute (OSAI) is an intensite, two week resident is lacademy for serious, disciplined and motivated high school students. Students are selected through a competitive, statewide and it in process to study with nationally renowned artists in the fields of acting, creative writing, ballet, modern dance, orchestra, chorus, drawing and painting, photography and film and video. In addition to studying a chosen field for at least six hours a day, students are exposed to a rich variety of art forms and learning experiences. Students and faculty attendand participate in performances, gallery openings, postry and ingo and recast ional act is it is faculty and student chamber music groups perform in the OSAI's chamber music series Etw Niew Quotavesk. The takent and cast is it y of students and faculty combine with the myst ique of Quanta Mountain to caste a powerful synengs.

The Oklahoma Arts Institute is part of a unique public/prisate partnership. Major funding is provided by prisate dorations secured by the Arts Institute, with matching funds from the Oklahoma State Department of Education and additional support from the Oklahoma Arts Council and the Oklahoma Department of Tourism and Recreation. This partnership guarantees that every student accepted to OSAI automatically receives a full scholarship to the program worth over \$2,000.

Quartz Mountain Arts & Conference Center

Quartz Mountain State Park in Lone Wolf, Okhahoma, overlooks the peaceful waters of Lake Altus-Lugert. An ancient, socred, and irop iring site, Quartz Mountain was common isl grounds for Kiowa, Comanche, Wichita, Apache and Caddo tribes. Today, Quartz Mountain is home to an Arts and Conference Center, an ideal retreat for arts immersion. With the 700 seat Robert M. Kerr Performing Arts Center, a state of the art darkmonn, five studio pavilions, an outdoor amphit heater, and the Beserly Badger Memorial Library, the Arts and Conference Center is the regions at istic epicenter. Quartz Mountain History

Aschoological evidence suggests Paleo-Indian people hunted woolly mammoth near Quarte Mountain between II,200 and 20,000 years ago. Escasations at the Cooperton Site in Kiewa County provide the earliest known evidence of people in the state of Oklahoma

Spain and France traded Quartz Mountain several times before the US, bought the area as part of the Louisiana Purchase in 1803. Several Native American tribes occupied the area until the late 1880s. In 1887, Quartz Mountain was affected by the Gold Rush, but the US, military segained control of the segion and opened the land to white settlement in 1901. In 1937, Quartz Mountain officially became a state park

The tiny town of Lugart was flooded to create a municipal water supply for Albas in 1927. Today, Lake Altus-Lugart also provides irrigation for 48,000 acres of southwestern Okhhoma farmland

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Quartz Mountain Ecology

Quarte Mountain State Park lies in a "buffer sone" between drier western climates and wetter eastern ones. As a result, there is a great discretly of habitate and plant and animal species inside of the park.

Quarte Mountain is in the mised-grass phins district. Tall grasses and heales grow on salley floors, while short grasses, prickly-pear and yucca grow on the unprotected hillstops. The most common type of tree in Quarte Mountain State Park is the scrub oak. Many types of flowers grow at Quarte Mountain, including guilland is (Indian Blanket), correspond, prairie lankspur, sunflower, spide awort and milkweed.

These distinct habitat regions ensure the presence of a variety of amphibians and reptiles. The eastern builting and the narrow-mouthed salamander like near the lake and a variety of toads and limited like on the hills ope. Several species of snakes, including the rattlemake, like in the hills and in the central region of the park triany mammalian species also make Quartz triaumtain their home, including the boboat, eastern cottontail rabbit, desert cottontail, raccoon, jackrabbit, deer mouse, ground squiral, coyote and beaver

Quartz Mountain State Park is a pandise for bird watchers. The majestic bald eagle winters at Quartz Mountain, and white pelicans and Caradian grees migrate through the park in the spring and fall. In the summer, the Eastern black-chinned humming bird, blackind, flickers, woodpecker, and wron like at Quartz Mountain. The lake and streams draw ducks and cranes. Red-tailed lowk and great housed owls make the mountains and greesbards their permanent homes.

Since Quartz Mountain State Park is a region of high discreit yand physiographic contrast, the area is particularly stated for the occurrence of are or endangezed species. Some of the are and endangezed flora and found at Quartz Mountain include the prairie falcon, golden eagle, bald eagle, green toad, mountain lion, mountain barrel cactus, waterfalls phlorand western lise oak

Quartz Mountain Art Collection

Owned by the Oklahoma Arts Institute, the majority of the Quartz Mountain Art Collection is on permanent loan to the state of Oklahoma for each bit ion at the Conference Center. The art collection serves as a visual record of the history of Quartz Mountain and the Arts Institute.

The collection is built around a series of eight murab entitled Quotz Monstate. Stand Goord, by Okhhoma artist Mike Larsen. The first four numb, The Stat, focus on Kiowa history, including the forced relocation from Yellowstone to Okhhoma, the sacred Sundance, the great Kiowa chief Satanta, and the Black Leggin Society. The last four numb, The Fetres, explore Quartz Mountain as a center of arts study, with depictions of Okhhoma Arts Institute faculty and students.

Sculptures by Allan Houserand Jesús Moroke adom the lodge lobby, and Fritz Scholder's artwork is featured in the lodge hallway. Two large paintings of deer by Okhhoman Joe Andre Hank the ballmom fayer. In the Sundance Case, Don Nice's paintings portray the natural environment of Quartz Mountain and OSAI disciplines. Each guest from at Quartz Mountain includes one of four prints by Daniel Kincz, a great supporter of the Okhhoma Arts Institute. Outside, large-scale tree scalptures by Israeli artist Meroshe Kadishman are the focal point of the countyard and guarters.

QUARTZ MOUNTAIN Works by Summer Arts Institute students are also on display in the Lodge. Visitors enjoy hage scale portraits of Quartz Mountain insects by 1992 drawing and painting students. Near the ballmont, photographs created by OSAI students from 1988-1993 are on display, and inside the ballmont here is a mural depicting earth, water air and fire, created by 2000 drawing and painting students.

A Rich Curriculum

The OSAI curriculum features a sariety of daily activities for students, faculty and staff. In addition to attending class six hours a day,
OSAI students participate in dance classes, performances, and recept ional activities, and many students choose to participate in optional


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
