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ABOUT OSAI

OKLAHOMA SUMMER ARTS INSTITUTE

The Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute (OSAI) is an intensive, two-week residential academy for artistically advanced high school students. Students are selected through a competitive, statewide audition process to study with nationally renowned artists in the fields of acting, chorus, creative writing, dance, drawing & painting, film & video, orchestra, and photography. In addition to studying a chosen field, students are exposed to a rich variety of art forms and learning experiences. Students and faculty attend and participate in performances, gallery openings, poetry readings, and recreational activities. The dedication and creativity of students and faculty combine with the mystique of Quartz Mountain to create a powerful synergy.

The Oklahoma Arts Institute is part of a unique public/private partnership. Major funding is provided by private donations secured by OAI, with matching funds from the Oklahoma State Department of Education and additional support from the Oklahoma Arts Council and the National Endowment for the Arts. This partnership guarantees that every student accepted to OSAI is supported by scholarships valued over \$4,000.

QUARTZ MOUNTAIN STATE PARK & LODGE

Home to Oklahoma Arts Institute programs since 1978, the Quartz Mountain State Park & Lodge is a state-owned facility of the Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department. Located in Lone Wolf, Oklahoma, the facility overlooks the peaceful waters of Lake Altus-Lugert. With the 700-seat Robert M. Kerr Performing Arts Center, a state-of-the-art darkroom, five studio pavilions, an outdoor amphitheater, and the Beverly Badger Memorial Library, Quartz Mountain is the region's artistic epicenter. Nature lovers enjoy hiking and biking trails, bird watching, and unique Oklahoma ecosystems. Quartz Mountain is truly an Oklahoma treasure.

LAND ACKNOWLEDGMENT


The place we now call Quartz Mountain was once part of the ancestral lands of several indigenous societies, including the Kiowa, Osage, Quapaw, Wichita, Comanche, Caddo, and Kickapoo nations. The Oklahoma Arts Institute at Quartz Mountain recognizes the original stewards of this land, and we extend our deepest appreciation to them. We strive to follow their example as we care for this beautiful place we call home.

Today, 39 distinct tribal nations call Oklahoma home, each of them contributing uniquely to our state's rich and diverse cultural landscape. We are grateful for the opportunity to learn from and collaborate with our indigenous friends and neighbors, and we are committed to fostering an equitable environment where all who gather at Quartz Mountain are united by a love for the arts and compassion for one another.

QUARTZ MOUNTAIN HISTORY

Archaeological evidence suggests Paleo-Indian people hunted wooly mammoth near Quartz Mountain as far back as 20,000 years ago.

Spain and France traded Quartz Mountain several times before the U.S. bought the area as part of the Louisiana Purchase in 1803. Several Native

American tribes occupied the area until the late 1880s. Throughout the 19th century, the United States government forcibly expelled hundreds of thousands of sovereign tribal citizens from their ancestral lands, exiling them to Indian Territory, now the state of Oklahoma. The lands surrounding Quartz Mountain were assigned to the Chikashsha Iyaakni' (Chickasaw), Chahta Yakni (Choctaw), Kiowa, Comanche, and Apache nations during this period of forced removal.

In 1887, Quartz Mountain was affected by the Gold Rush, but the U.S. military regained control of the region and opened the land to white settlement in 1901. The tiny town of Lugert was flooded to create a municipal water supply for Altus in 1927. Today, Lake Altus-Lugert also provides irrigation for 48,000 acres of southwestern Oklahoma farmland.

QUARTZ MOUNTAIN ECOLOGY

Quartz Mountain State Park lies in a "buffer zone" between drier western climates and wetter eastern ones. As a result, there is a great diversity of habitats and plant and animal species inside the park.

Quartz Mountain is in the mixed-grass plains district. Tall grasses and herbs grow on valley floors, while short grasses, prickly-pear, and yucca grow on the unprotected hilltops. The most common type of tree in Quartz Mountain State Park is the scrub oak. Many types of flowers grow at Quartz Mountain, including gaillardia (Indian Blanket), coreopsis, prairie larkspur, sunflower, spiderwort, and milkweed.

Three distinct habitat regions ensure the presence of a variety of amphibians and reptiles. The eastern bullfrog and the narrow-mouthed salamander live near the lake, and a variety of toads and lizards live on the hilltops. Several species of snakes, including the rattlesnake, live in the hills and in the central region of the park. Many mammalian species also make Quartz Mountain their home, including the bobcat, eastern cottontail rabbit, desert cottontail, raccoon, jackrabbit, deer mouse, ground squirrel, coyote, and beaver.

Quartz Mountain State Park is a paradise for bird watchers. The majestic bald eagle winters at Quartz Mountain, and white pelicans and Canadian geese migrate through the park in the spring and fall. In the summer, the Eastern black-chinned hummingbird, bluebird, flicker, woodpecker, and wren live at Quartz Mountain. The lake and streams draw ducks and cranes. Red-tailed hawks and great horned owls make the mountains and grasslands their permanent homes.

Since Quartz Mountain State Park is a region of high diversity and physiographic contrast, the area is particularly suited for the occurrence of rare or endangered species. Some of the rare and endangered flora and fauna found at Quartz Mountain include the prairie falcon, golden eagle, bald eagle, green toad, mountain lion, mountain barrel cactus, waterfall phlox, and western live oak.

QUARTZ MOUNTAIN FACILITIES

One of the critical ingredients to the Oklahoma Arts Institute's success is the Quartz Mountain facility, which provides seclusion and inspiration for the rigorous arts curricula. In the 1980s, the Institute raised private funds to build five studio pavilions, an outdoor amphitheater, and other artistic elements. In return, the State of Oklahoma entered into a 50-year lease arrangement with the Institute to use the facilities for its programs.

THE ART COLLECTION

The art at the Quartz Mountain Lodge is owned by the Oklahoma Arts Institute and is on permanent loan to the State of Oklahoma for exhibition at Quartz Mountain. The art collection serves as a visual record of the history of Quartz Mountain and the Arts Institute.

The collection is built around a series of eight murals entitled *Quartz Mountain: Sacred Ground*, by Oklahoma artist Mike Larsen. The first four murals, *The Past*, focus on Kiowa history, including the forced relocation from Yellowstone to Oklahoma, the sacred Sundance, the great Kiowa chief Satanta, and the Black Legging Warrior Society. The last four murals, *The Future*, explore Quartz Mountain as a center of arts study, with depictions of Oklahoma Arts Institute faculty and students.

In addition to these murals, a number of paintings, prints and sculptures by former Arts Institute faculty adorn the lodge. Visitors may recognize As Long as the Waters Flow, a bronze sculpture by Allan Houser, which is identical to one in front of the Oklahoma State Capitol, though smaller in scale. The collection includes several works by luminary Native American artist Fritz Scholder. Two large paintings of deer by Oklahoman Joe Andoe flank the ballroom foyer. And the Institute's first visual arts instructor, Dan Kiacz, is represented in the collection with a series of his whimsical prints that line the hallway to the restaurant.





While Oklahomans come to OSAI to study with their artistic heroes, faculty artists are drawn to the program by the promise of working with advanced, enthusiastic and disciplined students in an inspiring setting. Photographer Morley Baer explained that many years later, his fond memories of the OSAI experience were enhanced by "the memory of an intense and vivid curiosity on the part of many Oklahoma students. The insistence of their inquiry into the vision and technical mastery of photography stays in my mind even today."

Richard Carrillo *Chorus – Section Faculty* Miami, Florida

Dr. Richard Anthony Carrillo is Assistant Professor and Director of Choral Activities at the University of Nebraska at Omaha. Originally from Texas, Carrillo is a former member of the GRAMMY® awardwinning Houston Chamber Choir and served as the Associate Conducting Fellow with GRAMMY® nominated professional choir, Seraphic Fire during his doctoral studies. Dr. Carrillo is also a recipient of the Tinker Field Research Grant, which funded research in Mexico City to aid in his mounting of Frank La Rocca's Mass of the Americas. Dr. Carrillo holds degrees from the University of Miami's Frost School of Music (D.M.A. in choral conducting), Missouri State University (M.M. in choral conducting) and the Moores School of Music at the University of Houston (B.M. in music education).

Michael Joseph Barrett, who was awarded a D.Mus. (Performing Arts) in Choral Performance by the University of Pretoria in 2017, is currently the conductor of the University's (Tuks) Camerata choir and a senior lecturer in choral conducting in the Department of Music. He has received a Y2 rating from the National Research Foundation (NRF). Barrett's choirs have won numerous national and international awards and he is in demand as a choral clinician, a lecturer and an adjudicator both locally and abroad. Originally from Fenton, Missouri, she received her earliest music training with the St. Louis Children's Choirs, performing in New York City, Scotland, and Australia.

Currently, she is writing a biography of the international conducting pedagogue, Elizabeth A. H. Green.



Min-Jeong Koh Orchestra - Violin Buffalo, New York

Praised for her "extreme versatility" and "simply unbeatable beauty of tone" (Berliner Zeitung), Min-Jeong Koh maintains a busy schedule as a concert artist and educator. As first violinist of the Cecilia String Quartet, Koh won First Prize at the Banff International String Quartet Competition, 2nd Prize at the Osaka International Music Competition, and the Prix de la Sacem at the Bordeaux String Quartet Competition. Their latest recording was chosen as Gramophone Magazine's "Editor's Choice," "Top 10 Mendelssohn Recordings," and was nominated for a JUNO Award for Best Classical Album. Koh has performed across Europe, Asia, and North America at such celebrated stages as London's Wigmore Hall, Amsterdam's Concertgebouw, Berlin Konzerthaus, Beethoven-haus, Prague's Rudolfinum, Library of Congress, La Jolla Music Society, Stanford Live, among others. A passionate educator, she serves on the faculty at The Glenn Gould School and the Taylor Academy for Young Artists at The Royal Conservatory.



Ramiro Miranda *Orchestra – Violin* Pittsburg, Kansas

Ramiro Miranda is currently on faculty at Pittsburg State University and leads the Southeast Kansas Symphony Orchestra. He recently held the orchestra and upper strings position at Emporia State University from 2015 to 2023. A dedicated educator, he founded the Emporia State University String Camp and Stringfully, both projects that serve K-12 students in the Emporia area. As a violinist and chamber musician, Miranda has given solo recitals in the United States, Latin America, and China. He is a member of the Jopara Ensemble, Switchgrass String Quartet, and String Daze Trio. He is the recipient of many awards and honors, including a grant to attend the prestigious European American Musical Alliance's Nadia Boulanger Institute at the historic Schola Cantorum in Paris. A native of Asunción, Paraguay, Miranda came to the United States to pursue a bachelor's degree in violin performance at Pittsburg State University. Miranda also holds master's degrees from Illinois State University in violin performance and orchestral conducting, and a Doctor of Musical Arts in orchestral conducting from the University of Missouri-Kansas City.



Tze-Ying Wu *Orchestra – Viola* Lexington, Kentucky

Dr. Tze-Ying Wu is a violist, educator, and director. She is the Assistant Professor of Viola and String Education at the University of Kentucky and directs the UK String Project. She also serves on the Kentucky Governor's School for the Arts faculty for instrumental music. Before coming to Kentucky, she was the founding director of the Sturgis Music Academy of the Arkansas Symphony Orchestra. An active performer, Dr. Wu has played with the Lexington Philharmonic, Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra, Arkansas Symphony Orchestra, and Singapore Symphony Orchestra. In addition, as a member of the Formosa Trio (va/fl/hp), she has given performances in the US, China, and Taiwan. Dr. Wu received her Doctor of Music degree from Indiana University. She studied with Atar Arad and was an instructor for the IU String Academy, working closely with its director Mimi Zweig.

She has also released the first of three premiere recordings of the cello works of Georg Goltermann, with a second volume of sonatas to be released this summer. Karen Large is Assistant Professor of Flute at the Florida State University College of Music. She is a passionate flutist whose varied musical experiences have included performances as a concerto soloist, recitalist, chamber player, orchestral flutist, and piccoloist. She is principal flutist with the Tallahassee Symphony Orchestra, and performs regularly with AGLOW trio, Florida Flute Orchestra, and Traverso Colore: Baroque Flute Ensemble. She has enjoyed guest artist appearances throughout the United States as well as in Canada, Indonesia, New Zealand, and Thailand. Her playing can be heard on the albums The Light is the Same with AGLOW trio, Wanderlust: The Flute Music of David Amram, and String to Silver: Flute Transcriptions of Works in the Romantic Tradition. Beyond solo, chamber, and orchestral performance, Dr. Large's research interests also include creation of the world's first Virtual Flute Choirs, Baroque flute performance practice, and translating textile weaving code into music.

Anthony Stoops is Professor of Music at the University of Oklahoma School of Music, Principal Bass of the Oklahoma City Philharmonic, and is a member of the BrightMusic ensemble in Oklahoma City. He has performed as a member of over a dozen orchestras including the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, the Columbus (OH) and Toledo Symphony orchestras, as well as the Detroit Opera, and the Windsor Symphony Orchestra among others. Stoops started the bass in 4th grade in the renowned Westerville (OH) public schools string program. His first bass teacher was Sid Townsend and his orchestra director was Robert Pforsich, former principal 2nd violin of the Columbus (OH) Symphony. Private study in high school was with Dr. Mark Morton, principal bass of the Columbus Symphony. In college, he studied with Jeff Bradetich at Northwestern University, Diana Gannett at the University of Iowa and the legendary Stuart Sankey at the University of Michigan.



Lani Kelly Orchestra – Oboe Memphis, Tennessee

Lani Kelly plays with Memphis Symphony Orchestra, where she performs principal oboe duties and provides artistic leadership throughout the community. Prior to joining the MSO, Kelly served as principal oboe in the Jackson Symphony Orchestra and the Southwest Michigan Symphony Orchestra, in addition to recent appearances with the Nashville, Fort Worth and St Louis Symphony Orchestras. She loves working with young musicians and has served as faculty at Alma College and Michigan State University, where she directed several courses and maintained a private studio. Kelly received her bachelor's degree from New England Conservatory and her master's from Michigan State University, where she was awarded the prestigious University Distinguished Fellowship. She was a prizewinner at the Sphinx Orchestral Partners Competition in 2023, and a recipient of a fellowship from the Pittsburgh Symphony in 2007. Clarinetist Catherine Hudgins began her career in Caracas, Venezuela with the Orquesta Filarmónica de Caracas, later Sinfonica Municipal de Caracas, Charleston Symphony, and Boise Philharmonic. She has performed on five continents. Currently principal clarinetist with the Plymouth Philharmonic and Eb clarinetist for the Portland Symphony, she frequently performs as an extra with the Boston Symphony. As a duo-soloist with William Hudgins she most recently presented Daniel Crozier's Spirit premier, written for them. Chamber music includes Assisi Performing Arts, Spoleto, Rockport, and Scotia Festivals, Ensemble Chamarré, and West Stockbridge Chamber Players. Highlights in Japan include Saito Kinen Festival Orchestra, Tokyo Opera Nomori, and Mito Chamber Orchestra, led by Seiji Ozawa. As principal clarinetist for the 75th anniversary tour of Gershwin's Porgy and Bess, she toured much of the eastern half of the United States. Her recordings on Chandos, Decca, Deutsche Grammophon, and BSO Classics labels, include 3 Grammy winners.

Collins is third horn with the Black Pearl Chamber Orchestra and second horn with the American Studio Orchestra. His students have successfully gained positions at public schools, universities, colleges, orchestras, and in the music industry. Coelho is a passionate champion of contemporary music, actively commissioning, performing, and recording compositions from composers worldwide. He has released seven acclaimed CDs as a recording artist, earning national and international recognition. Currently, he is the Professor of Bassoon at the University of Iowa and the principal bassoonist with the Quad City Symphony Orchestra. He resides in Iowa City with his wife, Karen, and is a proud father of Liliana and Julia.



Robert Waugh *Orchestra – Trumpet* Clarksville, Tennessee

Dr. Robert Waugh is the Professor of Trumpet at Austin Peay State University, the principal trumpet with Gateway Chamber Orchestra, and frequently performs with Orchestra Kentucky and the Paducah Symphony Orchestra. As a chamber musician, he has performed tours throughout China, Thailand, Hungary, Austria, and Croatia with the Ambassador Brass Quintet. Altus promotes new works for trumpet and has given recitals throughout the United States. He is also an active commercial musician playing popular music with artists in Nashville, TN. Dr. Waugh earned his Doctor of Music from Indiana University, a Master of Music from the University of Oklahoma, and a Bachelor of Music Education from Capital University. 
John Gruber Orchestra – Low Brass Oberlin, Ohio

Janelle Lynch *Photography Instructor*New York, New York



Wren Pfahl **Public Relations & Outreach Coordinator**Oklahoma City, Oklahoma



Libby Sublett **Site Director** Tulsa, Oklahoma



In 2023, Blanco was awarded the National Humanities Medal by President Biden from the National Endowment for the Humanities. Born in Madrid to Cuban exile parents and raised in Miami in a working-class family, Blanco's personal negotiation of cultural identity and the universal themes of place and belonging characterize Blanco's many collections of poetry, including his most recent, Homeland of My Body, which reassess traditional notions of home as strictly a geographical, tangible place that merely exist outside us, but rather, within us. He has also authored the memoirs For All Of Us: One Today: An Inaugural Poet's Journey and The Prince of Los Cocuyos: A Miami Childhood. Blanco has received numerous awards, including the Agnes Starrett Poetry Prize, the PEN American Beyond Margins Award, the Patterson Prize, and a Lambda Prize for memoir. He was Woodrow Wilson Fellow and has received numerous honorary degrees. Currently, he serves as Education Ambassador for The Academy of American Poets and is an Associate Professor at Florida International University. In April 2022, Blanco was appointed the first-ever Poet Laureate of Miami-Dade County.




Christine Craddock


