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ABOUT OSAI

OKLAHOMA SUMMER ARTS INSTITUTE

The Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute (OSAI) is an intensive, two-week residential academy for serious, disciplined and motivated high school students. These young artists are selected through a competitive statewide audition process to study with nationally renowned faculty in the fields of acting, chorus, creative writing, dance, drawing & painting, film & video, orchestra and photography. In addition to studying their chosen field for at least six hours a day, students are exposed to a rich variety of art forms and learning experiences, participating in performances, gallery openings, poetry readings and recreational activities.

Major funding for OSAI is provided by private donations secured by the Arts Institute, with matching funds from the Oklahoma State Department of Education and additional support from the Oklahoma Arts Council and the National Endowment for the Arts. This public-partnership guarantees that every student accepted to OSAI automatically receives a full scholarship to attend.

UNIVERSITY OF SCIENCE & ARTS OF OKLAHOMA

This year, OAI was faced with the difficult task of planning for an in-person Institute during a pandemic. Because the facilities at the Institute's permanent home at Quartz Mountain would not allow for social distancing, OAI made the tough decision to relocate OSAI 2021 and was thrilled to be warmly welcomed by the University of Science & Arts of Oklahoma in Chickasha. Celebrating more than a century of service as Oklahoma's only public liberal arts college, Science & Arts is a recognized leader and innovator in interdisciplinary studies. Founded in 1908 as the Oklahoma College for Women, it was the first college created by Oklahoma's first Legislature. It is the only Oklahoma college named a National Historic District on the National Register of Historic Places.



Adult artists and educators are invited to join us for an all-inclusive, four-day workshop retreat at the Oklahoma Fall Arts Institute (OFAI). Taught by nationally renowned artists, workshops are offered for all skill levels in the visual, performing and literary arts and are held at the Quartz Mountain Arts and Conference Center in the Wichita Mountains of southwestern Oklahoma.

Participants can look forward to first-rate instruction by renowned artists from across the United States. Encouraging maximum artistic growth in a brief period of time, OFAI is a safe environment where participants can take risks and try new things, expanding their technique, knowledge and vision while renewing creativity, self-awareness, focus and enthusiasm.

Thanks to partnerships with the State of Oklahoma and generous private donors, scholarship funding is available to cover the tuition costs for Oklahoma PK-12 public school educators. Tuition discounts are available to Oklahoma private school educators, Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute alumni and those working in higher education.

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

These faculty join a prestigious roster of distinguished artists who have served as OAI faculty members.

Pulitzer Prize-winning author N. Scott Momaday, award-winning actors Jane Alexander and Richard Thomas, legendary photographer Richard Avedon, visual artists Fritz Scholder and Mike Larsen, and composer/conductor Samuel Adler are just some of the famous artists who have participated in OAI programs.

While Oklahomans come to OSAI to study with their artistic heroes, faculty artists are drawn to the program by the promise of working with talented, enthusiastic and disciplined students in an inspiring setting.

Photographer Morley Baer explained that many years later, his fond memories of the OSAI experience were enhanced by "the memory of an intense and vivid curiosity on the part of many Oklahoma students. The insistence of their inquiry into the vision and technical mastery of photography stays in my mind even today."

Dean Irby is a New York City-based director, actor and educator. He received his MFA from NYU School of the Arts Acting Program and has acted on Broadway (*The River Niger*), off-Broadway, and off-off Broadway. His television credits, among others, include *The Cosby Show, Another World*, and over 70 television commercials. He has directed over 100 off-Broadway, off-off Broadway, regional, and university productions for the New York Shakespeare Festival, the Negro Ensemble Company, Arena Stage, and the New Federal Theatre, among others. He has been an associate professor at the State University of New York at Purchase College for the past 24 years, where he is also co-coordinator of the BFA Acting Program. He has served as acting coach for several television shows, including four years with *The Cosby Show*.



Natalie Andrews **Acting – Voice Coach** Phoenix, Arizona

Natalie Andrews is a voice coach, teaching artist and creative, currently living and making in Phoenix, Arizona. She earned her BFA in Theatre Performance from the University of Oklahoma. Natalie's career as a teaching artist started when she was a senior in high school, and since then she has brought her passion for voice work, music, and storytelling to many arts organizations including Idyllwild Arts, the University of Oklahoma, Arizona State University, Commonwealth Theatre Center and the Cultural Services of the French Embassy. She started her own voice studio in 2014, now called Heartspark Voice, and is on a mission to help people find more joy, curiosity and agency in their self-expression and communication. Natalie is a singer/songwriter, and is currently writing her first album set to release in summer 2022. She is currently a Core Company Member of Southwest Shakespeare Company, a teaching artist at the Phoenix Conservatory of Music and corporate voice trainer with Vocal Authority.

Dr. Pearl Shangkuan is a highly sought-after conductor, lecturer and clinician who has led performances and workshops across six continents. Director of Choral Activities at Calvin University in Grand Rapids, Michigan, she is also chorus director of the Grand Rapids Symphony. Shangkuan has a signature choral series with earthsongs and is the music editor of the CICW choral series published by GIA. She made her conducting debut at Carnegie Hall in 2014 and was an invited guest lecturer at the World Symposium for Choral Music. Dr. Shangkuan has served on the jury of several international choral competitions in Europe and Asia, and has led conducting masterclasses for the ACDA national conference, Chorus America among many institutions and organizations in the US. She has conducted numerous All State honor choirs, ACDA division honor choirs, and other festivals nationally and internationally. She served as president of ACDA Central Division and Michigan ACDA which honored her with the Maynard Klein Choral Award for "artistic excellence and lifetime leadership in choral music."

Dr. Cari Earnhart serves as the Director of Choral Activities at California State University, Fresno. In demand as a conductor, clinician and adjudicator, Earnhart has worked with choirs in the US and abroad, holding positions in Florence, Istanbul and Dubai. She has conducted honor choirs and served as clinician for choral festivals across the US and Canada. She frequently presents workshops on Arabic Choral music, conducting techniques and vocal health for singers and conductors. An accomplished vocalist, Earnhart has performed professionally in the US, Europe and the Middle East. She holds a Bachelor of Music degree in Vocal Performance and Master of Music degrees in Vocal Performance and Pedagogy from Oklahoma State University and a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Choral Conducting with related field studies in Vocal Pedagogy from the University of North Texas. She is delighted to be returning for her fourth year as faculty at OSA!!



Jan Hanson Second Week Chorus Section Leader Chickasha, Oklahoma

Dr. Jan Hanson, Professor of Music, is the conductor of the Science & Arts Concert Choir and Chamber Ensemble. Dr. Hanson teaches coursework in Music History and Literature, Conducting and Music Methods. She is in frequent demand as a guest conductor, clinician and adjudicator throughout the area. In addition to her choral work, Dr. Hanson enjoys music directing stage works, including dozens of Science & Arts, community and regional music theatre productions, most recently, "Songs from a New World." As a collaborative artist, she accompanies performers on the piano, organ and harpsichord. Dr. Hanson has established and organized several initiatives with area schools, from elementary through collegiate. She hosted the inaugural Science & Arts Music Teacher Alumni Festival in March 2019, featuring Science & Arts teachers and their choirs in a joint performance.



Evangelos Spanos *Collaborative Pianist* Kansas City, Missouri

Evangelos Spanos is a Greek-born pianist who has performed extensively in the United States and Europe as a soloist and chamber musician. He maintains an active presence in the Kansas City music scene, currently serving on the music staff of the Kansas City Ballet and UMKC Dance department. Evangelos has also performed for numerous opera productions at the University of Kansas, Lyric Opera of Kansas as well as accompanying master classes for Martha Graham, Merce Cunningham, Mark Morris Dance Company, Dance Theatre of Harlem (summer intensive) and others. Most recently, he performed for productions at Music Hall (Book of Mormon) Starlight Theatre (Hairspray, Grease, Something Rotten, Little Mermaid) as well as playing for Evanescence and Zelda music concerts. Besides performing, Evangelos composes original music for media and dance projects. Parallel Lives (electronic composition) has been used by the Kansas City Ballet and Deeply Rooted Dance company in Chicago, in choreography by Gary Abbot.

Heather Bishop is currently the Choir Director and has been the Department Chair of the Performing Arts at Clovis North High School since it opened in 2007. She has also been the CUSD Elementary Music Resource Specialist for VAPA and a mentor teacher for the district. She served 10 years on the California ACDA Board as Repertoire & Standards Chair for women's voices and two terms as Central Regional Representative. In 1986 she received her Bachelor of Music from the University of Missouri-Kansas City Conservatory of Music in Piano Performance. Her choirs have received top honors in places all over the country including performances at the Heritage Festival of Gold and World Projects Festivals. Heather has served on the voice faculty at Idyllwild Summer Arts Academy since 2007. 
Shaohong "Betty" Yuan Orchestra – Violin Coach Oklahoma City, Oklahoma




Noel Wallace
