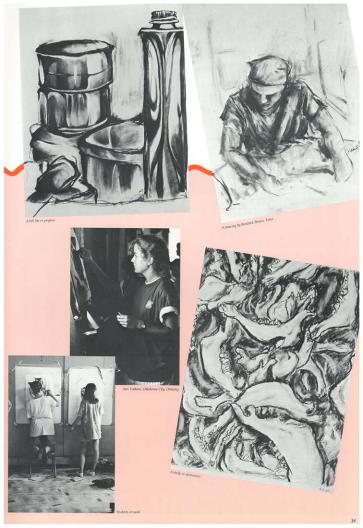












A New Commission . . . Quartz Mountain for Symphony Orchestra

Thomas has performed for film, television and stage as well as lecturing and giving seminars on the theater. His recent acting credits include the lead role in Hamlet, The Fifth of July, and Peer Gynt for stage; "All Quiet on the Western Front" for television; and for HBO Glory, Glory and Go Toward the Light.

MOVEMENT Irene Connors, Valencia,

Connors is currently a member of the California Institute for the Arts voice faculty, and has varied acting experiences in classical and modern drama. She has directed opera as well as theater, and has performed on radio and television. Most recently, Connors performed with the Arizona Repertory Theater Company.

Richard Thomas III. New York, New York

Thomas is the founder and director of the New York School of Ballet and its company, U.S. Terpsichore. A former president of the American Dance Foundation, Thomas has been teaching since 1965. His performance credits include productions with the American Ballet Theater, The Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo and the New York City Ballet.



Robert Zakanitch, New York, New York

Zakanitch is represented by Robert Miller Gallery, New York. He has worked as a commercial artist in an advertising agency and taught in California during the mid-70s. His work has appeared in many solo and included in the collections of the Whitney and Hirshorn Museums.

Tonu Montanaro, Portland, Maine

Montanaro studied mime in Paris with Marcel Marceau and his master, Etienne De Croux. After moving back to Maine in the early 1970s, Montanaro opened a theater and school: he has formed several national touring companies which have performed throughout the United States and abroad. He continues to teach and perform solo shows.

Hurll-Montanaro. although currently performing a duet show with mime Tony Montanaro, is a principal dancer with the Portland Ballet. Her principal study was in New York City with the American Ballet Center (now the Joffrey Ballet).

Catterson spent the 1988-1989 academic year as a Guest Professor at U.C.L.A. and Virginia Commonweaalth University. Both a painter and photographer, Nelson is represented by galleries in New York, Dallas, Oklahoma City and Santa Fe. 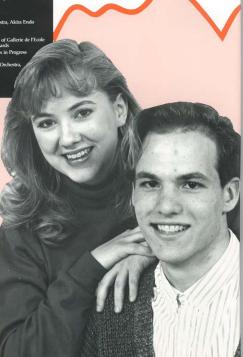

Cornerstone contributors are individuals, corporations and foundations in the private sector who have given money for the purpose of building new facilities at Quartz Mountain. The development of Quartz Mountain as an arts and conference center is a joint goal of the Oklahoma Arts Institute and the State of Oklahoma. Both the Institute and the state have formalized their plans in a contract which provides guidelines for the future development of this site as a cultural center

The new facilities will provide a permanent home

for the Institute's educational programs - th Oklahoma Summer Arts Institute and the Adult Institutes in the Arts - and will provide a meeting place for cultural groups in the region seeking a conference and seminar retreat site. Phase I has been completed, and includes five new studio pavilions, an amphitheater, a library and window wall for the indoor pool. THE ENDOWMENT FUND

Mountain Movers and Earth Shakers

Mountain Movers and Earth Shakers are those people who have contributed money to endow the Institute's programs. The establishment of a permanent fund guaranteeing the financial stability of the Oklahoma Arts Institute is a way to ensure the excellence of future programming. The Institute's endowment was established in 1985 with the award of a prestigious challenge grant of \$200,000 from the National Endowment for the arts. To date, nearly \$1 million has been contributed in cash and pledges. The Institute's goal is to raise an additional \$500,000 in 1989 to reach a goal of \$1.5 million.

Only the interest from endowment investments is used for programs. The endowment fund is managed by a professional money manager who reviews the fund in quarterly meetings with the Institute's finance committee. Accounting to donors who have established named funds is made every year following the Institute's annual audit. To establish a named fund, a gift must be \$10,000 or more. Donors wishing to establish funds may do so for student or teacher scholarships, faculty chairs, commissioned works

of art, publications and exhibitions and special projects. Of course, undesignated contributions in any amount are also appreciated as a source of income for general operating expenses.

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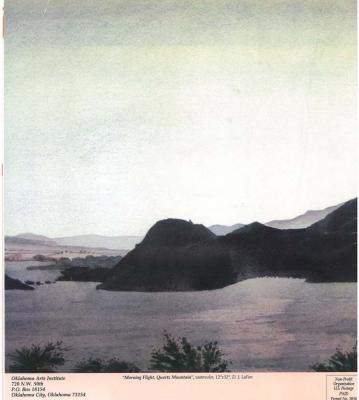
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
